I hope everyone is safe and well. This is an important newsletter, with complete information about how to access and participate in the September 25th awards virtual meeting. I am so pleased that all five authors will be joining us for question and answer sessions after their presentations, and that we will be able to provide breakout sessions with smaller groups after the larger meeting.

You may remember that a few years ago, FAW participated in a drive to send books to a school library in New Orleans that was decimated by Hurricane Katrina. This summer, considering the difficulties Chicago teachers and students were facing this year, The Board decided to take on a small project : to provide each student in a first-grade classroom at the Lawndale Community Academy with a copy of *Thank You, Omu* by Oge Mora, a past winner of our Young People's Literature Award. The books will be purchased from the Book Cellar and shipped directly to each student in the classroom. We are arranging a Zoom meeting with the author for the class.

First install the Zoom app. On Sep 25 slightly before noon, click on the link to join the meeting. This part of the meeting is a webinar and your video and microphone will be off. During the Q & A portion, you will have the ability to 'virtually' raise your hand. To ask a question Click **Raise Hand** in the Webinar Controls.

You will receive a message to unmute yourself. Unmute yourself and address your question to the author. You will be muted again when the question is complete. You may also submit a question to the authors via the 'chat' function. If you do not receive the link email by September 24, you can send a request to **CONCONCONCONCONCONCONC**




Special Feature: Break-out Rooms after the Awards meeting.

The Lost and Found Bookshop by Susan Wiggs

In this thought-provoking, wise and emotionally rich novel, bestselling author Susan Wiggs explores the meaning of happiness, trust, and faith in oneself as she asks the question, "If you had to start over, what would you do and who would you be?"

Susan Wiggs has written a charming story filled with family, hope, heart, and books. Natalie Harper has a stable but uninspiring job then tragedy strikes with her mother's death.
