We had our first meeting via Zoom September 25, and the virtual "Awards luncheon" was a success! All five of the prize-winning authors were eloquent, interesting, and honored by their awards. Those of you who attended were able to ask questions and then chat with other members in smaller breakout rooms.

Our October meeting will take place Wednesday, Oct. 21 at noon via Zoom. This is our Scholarship meeting, where Annella Thomas, a student from Columbia College's creative writing will accept a

\$3000 scholarship—this is considerable more than we have previously given out, a sum that is truly meaningful for a struggling student. Ms. Thomas will do a short reading from one of her essays, the first time we will have heard work in progress from a scholarship winner.

← Patricia McNair is a well-known Chicago writer who has published both a collection of essays (*And These Are the Good Times*, 2017) and a collection of short stories (*The Temple of Air*, 2011). In addition, she has a new collection of stories entitled *Responsible Adults* which will be out in December of this year. *Booklist* praised *And These Are the Good Times*, saying: "Short story writer McNair [is] an irresistible

personal essayist of refreshing candor, vibrant openheartedness, rueful humor, and unassuming wisdom." And fellow-writer John McNally has this to say about *The Temple of Air*: "It's a collection of fever-dreams: often haunting, always beautiful. These are lyrical stories that sear themselves into the reader's subconscious, and we are incredibly lucky that Patricia Ann McNair has written them."

Ms. McNair, who has managed a gas station, worked on the trading floor of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, and taught aerobics, received her BA from Columbia College Chicago in 1988 and her MFA from the same institution in 1996. Currently an associate professor in the English and Creative Writing department, she is the recipient of an Excellence in Teaching Award and a nomination for the Carnegie Foundation's U.S. Professor of the Year. Ms. McNair lives in Chicago with her husband, the visual artist Philip Hartigan, and "the ghosts of their cats, Pablo and Enrique."

Charlotte Walsh Likes to Win by Jo Piazza

Fiction, Politics

An exciting, insightful novel about what happens when a woman wants it all—political power, a happy marriage, and happiness—but isn't sure just how much she's willing to sacrifice to get it. Charlotte Walsh is running for Senate in the most important race in the country during a midterm election that will decide the balance of power in Congress. Still reeling from a presidential election that shocked and divided the country (sounds familiar!) and inspired by the chance to make a difference, she's left behind her high-powered job in Silicon Valley and returned, with her husband Max and their three young daughters, to her downtrodden Pennsylvania hometown to run in the Rust Belt state. A searing, suspenseful story of political ambition, marriage, class, sexual politics, and infidelity, Charlotte Walsh Likes to Win is an insightful portrait of what it takes for a woman to run for national office in America today. In a dramatic political moment like no other with more women running for office than ever before, Jo Piazza's novel is timely, engrossing, and perfect for readers on both sides of the aisle.

Just Us: An American Conversation by Claudia Rankine

Nonfiction, Race

As everyday white supremacy becomes increasingly vocalized with no clear answers at hand, how best might we approach one another? Claudia Rankine, without telling us what to do, urges us to begin the discussions that might open pathways

through this divisive and stuck moment in American history. *Just Us* is an invitation to discover what it takes to stay in the room together, even and especially in breaching the silence, guilt, and violence that follow direct addresses of whiteness.

The New Wilderness by Diane Cook

Science Fiction, Dystopia

A suspenseful second book by Dian Cook that explores a mother-daughter relationship in a world ravaged by climate change and overpopulation. Bea's five-year-old daughter, Agnes, is slowly wasting away. The smog and pollution of the City is slowly destroying her. Outside the city lies the Wilderness State, the last swath of open, protected land left. Here forests and desert plains are inhabited solely by wildlife. People are forbidden. Until now. Bea, Agnes, and eighteen others volunteer to live in the Wilderness State as part of a study to see if humans can co-exist with nature. Can they be part of the wilderness and not destroy it? Gripping, fierce, terrifying examination of what people are capable of when they want to survive in both the best and worst ways.

What Alice Forgot by Liane Moriarty

Fiction, Chick lit

Alice Love is twenty-nine, crazy about her husband, and pregnant with her first child. So imagine Alice's surprise when she comes to on the floor of a gym and is whisked off to the hospital where she discovers the honeymoon is truly over — she's getting divorced, she has three kids and she's actually 39 years old. Alice must reconstruct the events of a lost decade and find out whether it's possible to reconstruct her life at the same time. Ultimately, Alice must discover whether forgetting is a blessing or a curse, and whether it's possible to start over.

Dear Edward by Ann Napolitano

Fiction, Hope

What does it mean not just to survive, but to truly live?

One summer morning, twelve-year-old Edward Adler, his beloved older brother, his parents, and 183 other passengers board a flight in Newark headed for Los Angeles. Among them are a Wall Street wunderkind, a young woman coming to terms with an unexpected pregnancy, an injured veteran returning from Afghanistan, a business tycoon, and a free-spirited woman running away from her controlling husband. Halfway across the country, the plane crashes. Edward is the sole survivor. When you've lost everything, how do you find the strength to put one foot in front of the other? How do you learn to feel safe again? How do you find meaning in your life? *Dear Edward*, is at once a transcendent coming-of-age story, a multidimensional portrait of an unforgettable cast of characters, and a breathtaking illustration of all the ways a broken heart learns to love again.
