<u>December 9th, 2020 Program</u> – Celebrating the Season In Song with Julia and Ingrid



Friends of American Writers is proud to welcome Julia Porché and Ingrid Mikolajczyk, the daughters of FAW member Ellen Israel, to our virtual stage at noon on Wednesday, December 9. Both are acclaimed sopranos who grew up in the Chicago suburbs, traveled to Arizona to study vocal performance in college, and then went on to sing professionally in places such as Carnegie Hall and Ravinia.

Among the songs Julia and Ingrid will be singing for us are traditional favorites such as *The Wassail Song, I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day* and *Silent Night* along with readings from Charles Dickens, the poet Christina Rossetti and others.

Julia, who says her solo repertoire ranges from Mozart to vocal jazz, was an alternate soprano for the Arizona Opera chorus while still in college. Later, she performed at venues and festivals across North America and Asia. Julia, a newlywed, now lives in the Seattle area where she performs with the Bellevue City Opera Ballet, Choral Arts NW and The Dickens Carolers.

Ingrid, a professional soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, has performed principal and chorus roles in 30 operatic works throughout the United States, Italy and Austria. Among her solo repertoire favorites are Countess Almaviva in Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro* and Elle in Poulenc's *La voix humaine*. She

has recorded on DECCA Records London and CSO Resound labels and teaches at the Music Institute of Chicago-Winnetka. Ingrid lives in suburban Chicago with her husband and three-year-old daughter.

CHILDREN'S BOOK PROJECT - By Angela Gall

We're readers—that is what we do. When we suddenly awake in the middle of the night, and anxiety pulses through our veins, and sleep is a distant dream, we grab our book off our nightstand and feel the "beautiful stillness that surrounds us when we hear an author's words reverberating in our heads." (Paul Auster)

Or when we are literary trapped in our homes for months on end because a deadly disease is ravaging our world, "We read to know we're not alone." (William Nicholson) and because "Reading gives us someplace to go when we have to stay where we are." (Mason Cooley)

Yet, what do we do when we are glued to our TV, watching our cities implode with racial tension and injustice? Is it too easy to think, "Why can't people just sit and read books and be nice to each other?" (David Baldacci) But, maybe reading is the answer: "Reading is an act of civilization; it's one of the greatest acts of civilization because it takes the free raw material of the mind and builds castles of possibilities." (Ben Okri)

What if the castle of possibilities began with our youth? What if we purchased books for young readers to enjoy and learn?

Thus, the Friends of American Writers Children's Book Project was born. The entire FAW board was enthusiastic from the get-go. Karen Burnett proposed finding a Chicago Public School through the help of an organization called the Juvenile Protective Association (a great program that specializes in providing therapy for abused kids). From there, they got us in touch with a first-grade teacher from Lawndale Community Academy in Chicago.

We knew just the perfect book to purchase for the students: *Thank You, Omu* by Oge Mora. This book was our 2018 Young People's Literature Award Winner. The author came to our Awards' Luncheon, and she was just as wonderful as her book. The story is about a grandmother who makes a delicious stew and when the smell filters out into the neighborhood, her neighbors knock on her door and ask for some. Of course, she shares until it is all gone. When she is sad about having nothing left to eat herself, the neighborhood responds in kind and brings items to share with her. It's such a great example of how to create a sense of community through sharing, caring and thankfulness. It has actually become quite a popular book and has won numerous awards including the 2019 Caldecott Honor Book and the Coretta Scott King/John Steptoe New Talent Illustrator Award.

Next, we contacted Suzy from The Book Cellar who placed the order and shipped the books directly to the students so they would receive them at home in the mail. "The students were thrilled to receive their books in the mail. We are so thankful for this opportunity! It was the perfect book to talk about the spirit of Thanksgiving!" (Ms. P., first grade teacher)

Thanks to everyone who generously contributed to the funding of this project. We raised \$1,125. Thank you to Vivian Mortensen who managed the financial end, and Thank you to Tammie Bob, our president, for being a such a strong advocate of this project!
