January 13th, 2021 Program - Leslie Goddard as artist, Georgia O'Keeffe



Get ready for Friends of American Writers January program! We will welcome back Leslie Goddard portraying Georgia O'Keeffe.

Leslie Goddard is an award-winning actress and scholar who has been portraying famous women and presenting history lectures for more than 10 years. She holds a Ph.D. from Northwestern University specializing in U.S. history and American

Studies as well as master's degrees in both theater and museum studies. A former museum director, she is the author of two books on Chicago history and currently works full-time as a historical interpreter, author, and public speaker.

Georgia O'Keeffe was a leader in female painters and one of the first to achieve worldwide acclaim from art critics and the public. Women have historically struggled to be taken seriously in academic art circles, but the 20th century marked a significant change in these attitudes. Georgia started her art education at the Art Institute of Chicago and The Art Students League in New York, then later under the tutelage of Arthur Wesley Dow. O'Keeffe's paintings are unique in their style and subject matter, covering an unusual array of items in her bright, Modernist approach. You may be familiar with her

oversized **Oriental Poppies**. She features many flower subjects as well as New York skyscrapers and New Mexico landscapes in her paintings. Don't miss this wonderful presentation.

When it opened a decade ago, the acclaimed Los Angeles speakeasy The Varnish—owned, designed, and managed by award-winning cocktail aficionado Eric Alperin—quickly became the stylish standard bearer for modern bars. Unvarnished is a candid, voice-driven, no-holds-barred look at the workings of a bar, and the foundation of The Varnish's success: attention to hospitality and an abiding belief in the nobility of service. A bit of a history lesson, cocktail recipes, and well-kept bar secrets.

Alperin and veteran bartender and writer Deborah Stoll push back against the prevailing conceit that working in the service industry is something people do because they failed at another career.

Dear Mrs. Bird by A. J. Pearce

Historical Fiction

London 1940, bombs are falling. Emmy Lake is Doing Her Bit for the war effort, volunteering as a telephone operator with the Auxiliary Fire Services. When Emmy sees an advertisement for a job at the *London Evening Chronicle*, her dreams of becoming a Lady War Correspondent seem suddenly achievable. But the job turns out to be typist to the fierce and renowned advice columnist, Henrietta Bird. Emmy is disappointed, but gamely bucks up and buckles down.

Mrs. Bird is very clear: Any letters containing Unpleasantness—must go straight in the bin. But when Emmy reads poignant letters from women who are lonely, may have Gone Too Far with the wrong men and found themselves in trouble, or who can't bear to let their children be evacuated, she is unable to resist responding. As the German planes make their nightly raids, and London picks up the smoldering pieces each morning, Emmy secretly begins to write letters back to the women of all ages who have spilled out their troubles.

Anxious People by Fredrik Backman

Fiction

Looking at real estate isn't usually a life-or-death situation, but an apartment open house becomes just that when a failed bank robber bursts in and takes a group of strangers hostage. Each of them carries a lifetime of grievances, hurts, secrets, and passions that are ready to boil over. None of them is entirely who they appear to be. And all of them—the bank robber included—desperately crave some sort of rescue. As the authorities and the media surround the premises, these reluctant allies will reveal surprising truths about themselves and set in a motion a chain of events so unexpected that even they can hardly explain what happens next.

Backman incorporates feelings we all have experienced, during our biggest and smallest times of disappointment, grief, and feelings of despair while still being humorous and compassionate. At its heart, this book deals with human connection and the impact people have on each other.

The Second Chance Club: Hardship and Hope After Prison by Jason Hardy

Nonfiction

A former parole officer shines a bright light on a huge yet hidden part of our justice system through the intertwining stories of seven parolees striving to survive the chaos that awaits them after prison in this illuminating and dramatic book.

Prompted by a dead-end retail job and a vague desire to increase the amount of justice in his hometown, Jason Hardy became a parole officer in New Orleans at the worst possible moment. Louisiana's incarceration rates were the highest in the US and his department's caseload had just been increased to 220 "offenders" per parole officer, whereas the national average is around 100. Almost immediately, he discovered that the biggest problem with our prison system is what we do—and don't do—when people get out of prison.
