The holidays have arrived so quickly this year! I hope yours are happy and full. I also hope you can spare some time to





Tell us about your history with FAW.

Scot Harvath is enjoying some much-deserved R&R on a fjord in Oslo with his new romantic interest. But out of vacation days and long overdue back home, America's top spy has a decision to make—return or submit his resignation. Klara and the Sun is a masterpiece from Nobel Prize-winning author Kazuo Ishiguro about the saving grace of love. The story is set in a United States of the near future, a place riven by fascist political movements. Our narrator, Klara, is a type of robot known as an "Artificial Friend," designed as a companion for the children of this brave new world. Klara becomes the companion of a girl named Josie, who's sick, and the story turns on Klara's attempts to heal her.
