

Around the House: The Social and Political Influences on Women's At-Home Wear 1850-1870

Social and legal structures of the mid-19th century created a very different American Dream for women than what was attainable for men. These parameters shaped their world, relationships, ambitions and that most personal symbol: fashion.

Nanci Gasiel, director at The Salvation Army Central Territory Museum in Hoffman Estates, will be presenting

this program. She has been involved in museums for more than thirty years as an employee, volunteer, and living historian. Nanci holds a master's degree in History from the University of Illinois at Springfield and bachelor's degree in History and Political Science from Culver-Stockton College. Her master's thesis serves as the basis for this program. She lives in Downers Grove and enjoys cycling around the Chicago land region and gardening.

COVID-19 Information from the Fortnightly



Due to a new mandate from Mayor Lightfoot, which will affect our January luncheon, the Fortnightly is now required to ask for proof of vaccination for all patrons. Please be aware of this requirement and bring proof of your vaccination record when attending luncheons at the Fortnightly. We will have a FAW member checking for this at the door.

The Fortnightly is very pleased to report that 100% of the Fortnightly staff and managers have been vaccinated. All members of the staff will continue to comply with the City of Chicago masking mandate which has been in place since August 20.

Increased vaccination rates are the strongest preventative measure against COVID-19 currently available. We expect all members and guests to arrive fully vaccinated, if able, and be prepared to wear a mask as mandated by the City and State except when actively eating or drinking.

Please come with a face mask and your vaccination record as they will require proof of vaccination and for you to wear a mask when you are not eating or drinking. In the waning days of the Civil War, brothers Prentiss and Landry—freed by the Emancipation Proclamation—seek refuge on the homestead of George Walker and his wife, Isabelle. The Walkers, wracked by the loss of their only son to the war, hire the brothers to work their farm, and an unexpected friendship is forged. Prentiss and Landry, meanwhile, plan to save money for the journey north and a chance to reunite with their mother, who was sold away when they were boys.

Parallel to their story runs a forbidden romance between two Confederate soldiers. The young men, recently returned from the war to the town of Old Ox, hold their trysts in the woods. But when their secret is discovered, the resulting chaos, including a murder, unleashes convulsive repercussions on the entire community.

This is the debut novel of Nathan Harris. It creates an unforgettable cast of characters, depicting Georgia in the violent crucible of Reconstruction.

We received a big thank you from the smiling First Grade students at the Lawndale Community Academy. They were so thrilled to receive over 100 books from your generous contributions.


