

February 9th Program - Madam President: The Secret Presidency of Edith Wilson - Author William Hazelgrove.



William Hazelgrove, author of numerous historical novels and at least ten non-fiction books, will talk about his novel, *Madam President: The Secret Presidency of Edith Wilson*. After President Wilson had a debilitating stroke, his wife managed the executive branch from her husband's sick bed. Learn about how she was able to make decisions regarding international events and consider the ethical debate. Who has the power? Is the American public so easily deceived?

William Hazelgrove paints a vivid, engaging portrait of the woman who became the acting President of the United States in 1919. He is the National Bestselling author of ten novels and ten nonfiction titles. His

books have received starred reviews in *Publisher Weekly Kirkus*, *Booklist*, *Book of the Month Selections*, ALA Editors Choice Awards Junior Library Guild Selections, Literary Guild Selections, History Book Club Selections and optioned for the movies. Hazelgrove came of age in in the Chicago area, attended college, and published his first book, *Ripples* with a small local printer. His second and third novels, *Tobacco Sticks*, and *Mica Highways*, garnered enough attention that he decided to settle down in Ernest Hemingway's birthplace in Oak Park, IL.



Twenty years ago, the February program also featured President and Mrs. Wilson. Denise Riley Philpot's presentation on February 13, 2002 was based on the book *Edith and Woodrow: The Wilson White House* (Scribner, 2001).

The Lincoln Highway

I thoroughly enjoyed Amor Towles books *The Rules of Civility* and A Gentleman in Moscow, and quickly purchased his new book, The Lincoln Highway for my Kindle. The Lincoln Highway book is a winding tale of travel, self-discovery, friendship, and love. It is filled with history, legends, and myths.

In June 1954, eighteen-year-old Emmett Watson is driven home to Nebraska by the warden of the work farm Salena, where he has just served a year for involuntary manslaughter. He arrives home planning to get his brother, Billy, and put into action a well laid plan for their future which he developed while incarcerated. Emmett has plans to start a new life with Billy by driving to Texas, use his savings to purchase a fixer-upper house, fix it up, then sell it. His plans are first changed by the young and determined Billy, who convinces Emmett to instead drive to California to find their mother via the Lincoln Highway and arrive in San Francisco by July 4th. Young Billy has a set of postcards from his mother journaling her travel to California on the Lincoln Highway, with the last card detailing fireworks in San Francisco on her favorite day – July 4.

Unknown to Emmett, his plan is swept aside by his two friends from Salena, Duchess and Wooley, who have escaped and followed him home in the trunk of the warden's car. Duchess and Wooley hijack Emmett's car and hidden money and head in the opposite direction, to New York. This begins Emmett and Billy's great adventure to regain their car and money. They make their way to New York by stowing away on a freight train and encounter a memorable set of characters during this odyssey. Towles is a magnificent storyteller. I loved the journey and the rich cast of characters.
