Program: Author Ling Ma

Ling Ma, author of the FAW award-winning (2019) futuristic novel *Severance*, will be our guest speaker for the March 8 program. She has just published a very well reviewed collection of short stories, *Bliss Montage*. Her program will begin with a reading from her new work, followed by a conversation with FAW member and science fiction writer Joan Gordon. They will discuss the creative process, writing the fantastical, using and going beyond "writing what you know," and other topics to do with writing and finding a readership. Your questions and comments will be most welcome, as well.

Members of the Adult Literature committee still hark back to Severance as a wonderful



example of a book that is relatable (for us, a Chicago setting and the worst kind of corporate job,) thought provoking (our society felled by a virus both terrifying with oddly ironic symptoms) and populated by characters you have to cheer on. The new book, *Bliss Montage*, features eight short stories centered on women, mostly in fabulist circumstances, attempting to control their environments. This book will be the subject of Readers and Reviewers (see announcement below), at 11:15 before the luncheon.

Created between 1400 and 1410, it contains what is believed to be a portrait of Chaucer as well as miniature paintings of twenty-two of the fictional pilgrims." Though my travelling companions had little interest in such things, even they were impressed by the beauty of the manuscript and the charm of the Huntington Library and Gardens.
