Donations Needed for FAW Children's Book Project

Since returning to my teaching job these past two years, I have never felt the power of picture books more. For my Freshmen Writing Class, I have the students writing about the benefits of children's books for a research project. During this unit, I read to them a variety of books, so they can experience these benefits. I shared with them many of our award-winning authors. After reading one such book called Thank You, Omu by Oge Mora, they immediately broke out into applause. I can't tell you how much their reaction moved me--not only to know that we as FAW members picked such an endearing book for an award, but that kids today still have an open-heart for wonderful stories.

During this unit, we learned some fascinating things about picture books, one being that it is the great equalizer. "Sadly, brain development can be hampered by poverty. Studies have shown that early childhood poverty is a risk factor for lower educational attainment. It is also associated with differences in brain structure, poorer cognition, behavioral problems, and mental health symptoms. Results from a study from Berkeley discovered that children who read for pleasure had larger cortical surface areas in several brain regions that are significantly related to cognition and mental health. Importantly, this was the case regardless of socioeconomic status. The result therefore suggests that reading for pleasure in early childhood may be an effective intervention to counteract the negative effects of poverty on the brain (Sahakian et al)."

This year, our FAW Children's Book Project will be donating 150 books to elementary students at Carver Elementary in the Altgeld Gardens neighborhood in Chicago. We will be giving each individual student a copy of Black Is a Rainbow Color by Angela Joy, our 2022 FAW Young People's Literature Award Recipient. The teachers there thought this book would be an excellent addition to their Black History Month celebration. With this program, we hope to create a lasting relationship with Carver Elementary through teacher feedback.

I just discovered that only 2% of the students at Carver Elementary are reading at or above proficiency. This is significantly lower than the Illinois state average of 30%. Please join us in sponsoring our Children's Book Project. The transformative nature of literature is the greatest of gifts. 
